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National Agriscience Competitors- Researching Consumers' Concerns and Opportunities in the Ag Industry


Three individuals will be representing South Dakota FFA at the 88th National FFA Convention.

Callie Mueller, a sophomore from the Florence FFA Chapter, will be competing as an individual in the junior division of the Social Systems category. Mueller's project is titled, "Do Aq Related Jobs Have a Negative Effect on a Person's Lungs?" For her project, Mueller used a spirometer to test lung function in working men, while also having each worker complete flow rate tests and a questionnaire on health related habits. She found that ag-related jobs do have a negative effect on a person's lungs, causing more lung health problems. Mueller then divided the workers into two groups: farmers and elevator workers. By doing this, she found that the elevator workers' lungs were much more effected than the farmers' lungs –

with both lower flow rates & more lung problems.

Kiera Leddy, a freshman at South Dakota State University, and Kadon Leddy, a junior from Milbank High School, both members of the Milbank FFA Chapter, will be competing as a team in the senior division of the Social Systems category. Their project entitled "Are South Dakota Schools Engaged in the Farm to School Program?" consisted of sending an online survey to all 220 school districts in South Dakota. This survey examined schools' involvement with the Farm to School Program - a nationwide program that partners local producers with schools which buy and utilize farm-fresh foods on their menus. The sister and brother Leddy team received 143 responses and concluded 44% of schools surveyed in South Dakota support the Farm to School program.

The American FFA Degree is one of the highest honors that the National FFA Organization can bestow upon a member. In order to obtain the American Degree, FFA members must fill out an application and meet the guidelines set forth by the National FFA Organization, which is no easy task. To be eligible for the American Degree, FFA members must make \$10,000 and invest \$7,500 in their respective Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) program or invest \$2,000 and work over 2,250 unpaid hours. Along with the hours and income, the FFA member must have over fifty hours of community service and maintain a C average. It takes a lot of passion for the FFA, service to community, and dedication to an SAE to achieve the requirements for the American Degree.

Kaden Eisenbraun of the Wall FFA Chapter is one member receiving his American FFA degree this year. Eisenbraun's Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) project consisted of working as a ranch hand for Eisenbraun Inc. and owning his own herd of Angus cattle. For Eisenbraun, receiving his American Degree is something he has had his sights set on since working for his Greenhand Degree freshman year.

"The American Degree is such a great honor, and I feel very blessed to be selected to walk across the stage and receive it this year," Eisenbraun said. "With hard work and determination the American Degree can become a reality for any member."

National Proficiency Finalists Headed to Louisville

South Dakota will be well represented by proficiency finalists at National Convention this fall. As a state, South Dakota sent 34 proficiency award applications to the national level and seven of those applications were selected as national finalists. The seven finalists include: Adam Eichacker, McCook Central; Andrew Streff, McCook Central; Bo Peterson, McCook Central; Cole Schock, McCook Central; Derek Hight, Viborg-Hurley; Ethan Schallenkamp, McCook Central; and Victoria Krempges, McCook Central.

To be selected as a national finalist, a member's winning state application is sent on to the national level; then, at the national level, the application is judged and deemed a national finalist if the application is selected in the final four. From there, the seven finalists will attend the National FFA Convention to participate in an interview related to their specific proficiency award area. Finally, the finalists will be brought on stage during the sixth general session, and a national winner will be announced in each area.

Curious what a National Proficiency finalist looks like? Read on to learn a little about 4 of South Dakota's National Proficiency finalists.

Adam Eichacker's proficiency area is Beef Production Entrepreneurship. His herd currently consists of twenty Simmental and Sim-Angus cross cattle. Eichacker works hard to make sure his family's bulls are ready for their annual bull sale and takes cattle to area shows to promote his animals' genetics. His biggest challenge is managing his time efficiently between school activities and care of his herd.

Andrew Streff is another one of the finalists. His project is in the area of Fiber and/or Oil Crop Production. Streff's application consists of working for the family farm in soybean production, and renting 25 ½ acres for his own soybean crop. He said the hardest part of his project has been overcoming the grain markets to make sure that he turned a profit at the end of the year.

Cole Schock is a finalist in the area of Diversified Livestock Production. Schock works with both dairy and beef cattle. His biggest challenge has been trying to track all the differences between the two types of livestock, such as nutrition, rations, health, and calving records.

Derek Hight is competing in the category of agricultural services. He runs a custom haying operation in the Viborg-Hurley area. Finding customers was his main challenge; however, Hight overcame this obstacle by always doing good work for his customers, and his positive reputation spread.

Muddy pits, slippery plant lines, and damp range sites were the story of the 64th annual National Land and Range Contest. Over 500 4-H and FFA members gathered near Oklahoma City to compete for the title of national champion. South Dakota FFA was well represented, sending three teams in the range division: Wessington Springs, Newell, and Clark; and five teams in the land division: McCook Central, Highmore, Viborg-Hurley, Jones County, and De Smet.

Contestants spent a week in Oklahoma during early-May practicing for and competing in the national contest. Early in the week, members had the chance to go through some practice sites and plant lines. FFA members from South Dakota had to adjust to the red soil of the southern United States, as well as many new plant varieties not found in the northern plains.

In addition to the land and range contest, some chapters toured local sites. Wessington Springs FFA members made the trip more than just competitive by visiting the Remington Park horse races, the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum, and Braum's – an ice cream and burger chain famous in Oklahoma. Additionally, this year's contest had an added "twist" as tornadoes struck the area during the week, resulting in exotic animals from the Tiger Safari scattered everywhere.

In the end, Newell was the highest placing Range team from South Dakota at 11 of 26 teams, and McCook Central's Land team placed 9 of 98 teams.














Washington Leadership Conference – Inspiration, Friendships, Service
