


SD Members Excel at National FFA Convention

Game On!

On January 12-13th, the state FFA officers and 43 district officers gathered in Pierre for a legislative breakfast and district officer training. These FFA members are their district leaders and will advocate for agriculture, agriculture education, and FFA at various events all year.

The highlight of the two day event was a breakfast hosting nearly 50 legislators and cabinet members. The state officers' program focused on the three-part model of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources education; classroom instruction; Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) projects; and FFA. District officers and advisors visited one-on-one with legislators, sharing how our 102 agriculture education/FFA programs provide hands-on, rigorous and career relevant experience for members.

District officer training, led by the six state officers, was themed "Game On," and themed around arcade games (Pac-Man, Space Invaders, Mario, Frogger, and Tetris). Training focused on teamwork, building agricultural knowledge, and professionalism - including a dining etiquette training, agriculture advocacy, understanding personality types, and developing a plan to make a difference this year. Additionally, they engaged in roundtable discussions with Representative Caleb Finck and Representative Lana Greenfield, House Education Chair, who spoke on the legislative system, the education committee, and page and internship opportunities. FFA officers reflected in the Capitol Rotunda on service and being impactful.

Our Range team also competed at the National Competition in Oklahoma last May.



Brookings FFA - To aid their high school's mental health, they offered animals as stress relief in their schools' ag room multiple times. They also organized FFA week events including educating middle schoolers about agriculture.

Chapter Visits Eye-Opening for Members & State Officers

During September, October, and November, the state officers were busy conducting FFA chapter visits across South Dakota. They visited 56 chapters, in teams of two, to help grow leadership and motivate agricultural education students across the state. The

state officers focused on teaching FFA history, developing members' advocacy skills, and helping chapter members discover the importance of networking. The officers were also given the opportunity to witness a variety of chapter classroom projects. At Hitchcock-Tulare, members are experimenting with micro-green production in their greenhouse, discovering the different nutrients micro-greens offer. Their long-term plan is to incorporate the micro-greens into their school food program. In Rapid City, members use a variety of animals (including chickens, birds, lizards, and snakes) and aquaculture to give students a hands-on learning experience. These are a couple unique projects state officers saw while touring the state. It was an enlightening experience and they enjoyed the opportunity to see the innovative projects teachers are providing for agricultural education students and the opportunity to get to know SD FFA members a little better. 



For the second year in a row, South Dakota FFA showcased agriculture in the Rodeo Zone, at Rodeo Rapid City, January 28th- February 5th. They hosted the Ag Adventure Zone, where state officers, district 5 officers, west river FFA chapters, and special guests spent the week advocating for agriculture and spreading consumer awareness.

The FFA Ag Adventure Zone was sponsored by South Dakota Farm Bureau as a special project of the SD FFA Foundation. "We are extremely thankful for the support of the South Dakota Farm Bureau and Sutton Rodeo to bring this important event to Rodeo Rapid City. We hope that this partnership will carry on for years to come so we can continue to educate the public about agriculture," says South Dakota FFA Executive Secretary Dani Herring.

The Ag Adventure Zone was patterned after the popular Ag Adventure Center, coordinated by South Dakota FFA annually at the South Dakota State Fair. The two activities share the same mission: "To showcase modern agricultural practices, communication, commitment to natural resources and demonstrate wholesome, safe food production." State FFA officers hosted educational games and activities for attendees to take part in and were able to talk to stock show goers about agriculture in South Dakota. Sheridan Deering, Wall FFA member, said. "I really enjoyed talking to the people who came through the Ag Adventure Zone. It was fun to learn about what people think of agriculture and teach them about what's going on in South Dakota.'





The SD FFA also launched "FFA Day" on Monday, January 31st as part of Rodeo Rapid City. Fifteen chapters and over 300 FFA members from South Dakota, Nebraska, and Wyoming attended, learning from industry leaders in four agriculture pathways: animal systems, plant systems, power/structural systems and advocacy/ communications. Presenters included: SD Farm Bureau, SD Pork Producers, SD Beef Industry Council, SD Stock Growers, Tyson Foods, SD Soil Health Coalition, Dakota Mill & Grain, BASF, Butler Machinery, Agtegra, Brink Construction, and the SD National Guard. FFA members gained insight into current agricultural practices and innovations and asked questions. They also attended a livestock judging school, cattle shows and sales, visited the vendors, and checked out the rodeo performance slack. Morgan Mackaben- Belle Fourche shares, "FFA Day at Rodeo Rapid City really opened my eyes on how I can make a difference even though I am a high school student." Bree Jackson, Ten Sleep Wyoming FFA, added, "As an out of state ag student, I appreciate the opportunities and experiences given to us, and the overall quality of presenters."

FFA members and communities from across the nation will celebrate National FFA Week with activities and service projects. We asked SD chapters to share with us their top event ideas... Whatever you do, however you celebrate, be sure to share with the SD FFA Foundation on Facebook to spread the celebration!

- 1. **Businessmen's Breakfast** Members fix an early morning buffet-style breakfast to thank businesses, community members and school staff or deliver them a cupcake and a coke at the end of the school day, with a thank you note for everything they do for FFA.
- Greenhand Night First year FFA members are invited to a night filled with games, leadership activities, and helpful FFA
 hints to make the most out of their years ahead in the blue jacket.
- 3. **Pass the Chicken** Fundraise and get your community involved! Take the chicken to different businesses or teachers where they pay to pass it to a different business or pay for "insurance" to not get it back. It is a great way to develop new community connections and thank businesses and staff members.
- 4. **FFA Emblem Scavenger Hunt** This gets the whole school involved or business involved! At the beginning of the week, chapter officers hide FFA emblems around the school or community. Anyone who finds an emblem can bring it to the ag classroom to win a prize.
- 5. **Speak Loud and Proud** Schedule newspaper, radio, or TV interviews to share FFA's values and mission. Share ag education facts on social media to spread the word about FFA and ag education to others. Talk about why you joined/stayed in FFA, and opportunities for members.
- 6. Package it up! Follow the FFA motto of "Living to Serve" and package meals for those in need in your community, or conduct another service project.
- 7. **Blast from the Past** Ask alumni to take their FFA jackets to work, hang on their chair, and start conversations about how FFA impacted their career and share their story on social media!
- 8. **Kiss an Animal** Set up one set of jars with different animals and another set of jars with different teachers' names on them. Students have a penny war, voting for one teacher and one animal they want that teacher to kiss. At the end of the week have the winner kiss the winning animal in front of the school.
