



## Two Members Take Home Top Honors at National FFA Convention

South Dakota was well represented on the National FFA Convention stage this year in the area of proficiency awards. The South Dakota FFA Association had seven members make it into the final four and appear on stage at the 88th

annual National FFA Convention held October 28th through the 31st, 2015. There are forty-seven proficiency award areas that are awarded each year at the National FFA Convention. The proficiency award applications are filled out on the students supervised agricultural experience projects showing what they have learned, how their project has grown, and

how they hope to expand their project into the future. Two of our seven finalists that went to Louisville, KY to interview were honored with taking home a first place plague for their respective area. The two winners from South Dakota in 2015 are Derek Hight from the Viborg-Hurley FFA Chapter and Andrew Streff from the McCook Central FFA chapter. Andrew also won a trip to Costa Rica where him and sixty other FFA members will tour coffee, banana, flower, pineapple, dairy, and beef farms.

Andrew's proficiency award was in the category of Fiber and/or Oil Crop production. His project includes both an entrepreneurship and a placement aspect. Supervised agricultural experience projects fall into one of two categories which are placement and

entrepreneurship. In a placement setting members work for an employer and in an entrepreneurship the member has

their own land for crops, livestock, or business. For Andrew's project his placement part was working for his parents producing soybeans and the entrepreneurship part involved renting twenty-eight and a half acres of land and growing his



own soybeans. Andres supervised agricultural experience project is bigger than just the parts included in the Fiber and/or Oil Crop production. Andrew also actively helps his parents in raising the families corn crop and raises sixty acres of his own corn. His other responsibilities include custom side dressing, land rolling, and washing and waxing farm equipment.

Once members are selected as a finalist they go through an interview process at National Convention. Andrew said, "The interview process went well for him and he was the third one to go in." These interview are ten to fifteen minutes long. "The judges ran out of questions eight minutes in and then asked if Andrew had any to add since they were finished early." Andrew took advantage of this time to talk about marketing of his soybeans and show the judges the all-around knowledge that he has. Andrew credits taking advantage of that time as what helped him win his award. Andrew has put a lot of hard work into his project and want to thank his parents for encouraging and helping him build his SAE project as well as his advisor Mr. Rieckman who has helped Andrew fill out his SAE record book and proficiency

awards as well helping get Andrew ready for his interview at National FFA Convention.



The theme was "FFAmily Vacation", and each session focused on a pit stop in the "Fischer" family vacation to Brookings, South Dakota.

Wednesday's training was kicked off with district officers getting to know their fellow teammates, as well as other teams from across South Dakota. They then watched a legislative session and were applauded for their outstanding leadership in their chapters and districts. Throughout the day, the district officer teams were challenged to accomplish various tasks utilizing their team members' strengths, such as creating a "We Are FFA" video. ### South Africa: A Natural Wonder

74 State Officers, six Chaperones, 17,917 miles, one unforgettable experience. The 12-day International Leadership Seminar for State Officers (ILSSO) to South Africa took place from January 4th through January 16th. This once

in a lifetime opportunity served as a cross-cultural learning experience for past and present FFA state officers who wanted to learn more about global agriculture.

After two days of orientation in Washington D.C., we arrived at the airport in anticipation for our 18-hour flight to South Africa, where

we would eventually get to see the agricultural landscapes in five of the country's nine provinces. When we arrived in Pretoria, South Africa, we started off our adventure by meeting with government and U.S. embassy officials about U.S. and South African trade relations. We also visited a commercial Nile crocodile farm where they have more than 8,000 crocodiles. At our next stop we were welcomed with cheers

of joy as we arrived at a vegetable farm where they were harvesting carrots by hand, which we also got to take part in. We finished off our time in this area by visiting a Boer goat stud farm, a protea farm, which is the South African national flower, a 26,000 head cattle feedlot, as well as a 17,000 hectares (42,008 acres) family owned farm.

In addition to experiencing their farmland, we also got close to some of South Africa's largest game animals. We spent some quality time on a game drive through 9,000 hectares (22,239 acres) of wilderness, seeing all the "Big

Five" animals: lions, leopards, elephants, rhinos, and buffalos, as well as many others. Afterwards, we were fortunate enough to take in the beautiful scenery of the Blyde River Canyon.


For the second part of our trip, we flew down to Cape Town. While there, we visited a winery, fruit

exporters, olive oil producers, and wheat, sheep, and Jersey cow farms. We also had the opportunity to visit the Kaymandi Township (Xhosa for "nice home"), where we got to learn a little bit about Xhosa culture,

history, and how they make ends meet on a daily basis.

Visiting South Africa showed me the importance of the concept once a family, always a family and to remain humble in my everyday life, even during the hardest times.

This experience is one that will forever be engrained in my mind, and I am excited to share this life changing experience with anyone who asks. It was so tough to say goodbye "Baie Dankie" to a place that has changed my life for the better, but it helped me grow a stronger passion and appreciation for international agriculture.

### **CELEBRATE National FFA Week!**

This year, we will celebrate the 68th National FFA Week. The tradition goes back to 1947 when the National FFA Board of Directors decided to honor George Washington's legacy for being such a strong and proud agriculturalist. Therefore, they decided that National FFA Week would encompass his birthday, February 22nd. The first National FFA Week was held in 1948, and has been a continuing celebration each year since.

Here in South Dakota, we have many active chapters during FFA Week. For example, the Brookings FFA Chapter likes to stay involved with the local community and school district. Brookings FFA members hold a breakfast for the teachers and staff members of the entire school district on Monday February 22nd. Brookings FFA member, Cole Schneider, says "This is a good way for other teachers to see all we do in FFA." The main event for the Brookings chapter during FFA Week, however, is an animal nursery hosted in their Ag shop. The animal nursery will be open to members of the high school and all three elementary schools of the Brookings School District on Friday, February 26th and open to the public from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. Saturday, February 27th. Just last year, the Brookings FFA Chapter animal nursery was attended by over 500 people in the community, now that is making an impact! In addition, members encourage students and community members to bring canned food items to donate back to the Brookings Food Pantry.



In Viborg, chapter officers and members host an event called "Food for America" where elementary students are educated about how ingredients in day-to-day food items come from farms. Elementary students are

brought into the classroom one grade at a time where they actually get to make and eat their own ice cream. Once the students are done with the activity, they go through the petting zoo also put on by the members. Viborg-Hurley chapter Treasurer, Logan Slack, says "It's so fun to lead and educate the younger kids and to show them the importance of our support

for agriculture and to show them how it affects their everyday lives." In addition to their "Food for America" program, Viborg-Hurley members don't stop there—they also create dress-up days during the week when students can dress like farmers, hillbillies, and even animals!

National FFA Week gives members, alumni, and supporters the chance to advocate for agriculture and all that agricultural education offers students across the country. This celebratory tradition has grown with impact, as chapters and state associations have begun their own traditions, celebrations, fundraisers, and campaigns to spread their message about FFA, agriculture, and the importance of consumer education.




