

Program Prepares Young Farmers For Success in the 21st Century

Agriculture in general— and *farming* in particular—is an exciting, fast-paced, high-tech career for the new millennium, according to 40 outstanding young people selected to participate in the 2006 New Century Farmer Program. An exclusive, highly competitive program that sets out to nurture and develop young people committed to farming as a career, the New Century Farmer Program is sponsored by the Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. and Rabobank, as a special project of the National FFA Foundation.

Holly Marshall, Redfield; Lee Kopriva, Clark; Jason Biel, Wilmot; and Seth Zilverburg, Highmore were four of the successful applicants, ages 19-22, chosen from 19 U.S. states, representing many different geographies and types of farming operations.

40 Earn the Golden Key

Forty South Dakota FFA members will receive the coveted gold American Degree key, the highest degree awarded by the National FFA Organization. This honor recognizes demonstrated leadership abilities and outstanding achievements in agricultural business, production, processing and service programs. Recipients must have earned \$7,500 through a supervised agricultural experience program and productively invested those earnings.

Only about one half of one percent of the total national membership attains this high honor. In 2006 that is a record breaking 3055 student's nation wide. Waubay FFA - Twenty-Two Waubay FFA Members traveled to Fargo, North Dakota on September 13th to attend the Big Iron Agricultural Exhibition. They were able to view more than 800 exhibitor's displays. A tour of the Case IH/New Holland tractor factory was conducted in the morning. Twenty-Five of the four wheel drive tractors, payloaders, and bi-directional tractors are built every twenty-four hours. The factory employs about 900 people during two shifts at this location. 80 percent of the welding is done by robots that have been programmed. The average wage is about \$18 to \$20 an hour, plus benefits, with starting wages about \$13. The Wilmot FFA Chapter Members traveled with Waubay. A Homecoming Parade entry is also planned.

Wilmot FFA - Thirty-Two members toured the Case IH/NewHolland Tractor Factory in Fargo. The manufacturing process starts with large, flat, thick sheets of steel that are cut with a plasma torch and then welded into parts for the tractors. The assembly line proceeds with the installation of transmissions, engines, and cabs. The end result is the production of twenty-five units built every day. The afternoon was spent at Big Iron, the largest agricultural exhibition in the Midwest. The chapter also had an entry in the Homecoming Parade.

Bridgewater FFA -. Some of the projects we have or are working on include participating in FFA leadership camp, the TRAP program, land judging, and organizing the Program of Activities. The chapter held its first official meeting of the year on September 18 with thirty-two members in attendance. The meeting was preceded by a welcome-back cookout in the shop. Since the University was located on the Caribbean side of the country they had a banana plantation and processing plant that we toured. At the University's research farm they utilized a bio-digester, which was a highlight of mine as far as the educational part of the tour. The bio-digester was basically a large plastic bag that trapped the methane, as the manure was passed through the system. At various farms we toured they used this methane for electricity, heat, and even cooked food with it!

Another interesting part of the experience was when we were paired up to stay with a host family for 2 nights in the city of San Jose. My attempts at speaking Spanish didn't get us very far, until the father of the household came home from work, and luckily he could speak broken-English.

Visits to a crocodile farm, a walk through the rain forest on hanging bridges, visiting volcanoes, walking through a coffee plantation as well as the factory, and white water rafting made for a very enjoyable experience.

I was fortunate to attend this international travel experience because I was chosen as the 2005 American Star in Agriculture Placement. The other FFA members from South Dakota were finalists in their proficiency area at the National Level. Basically, any FFA member is capable of winning this trip. The records you are keeping now for your SAE's are sure to pay off, when you are able to apply for a proficiency award and win a trip as well as money.

International travel is a unique opportunity to physically be involved in a foreign country, as well as look at the United States from the perspective of another country. The experience was definitely educational, the price was right, and the only regret we had was that we weren't able to bring any of the rain back with us in our luggage.
