

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Achieving Top Gun

On January 11th and 12th, South Dakota's 49 district FFA officers attended a District Officer "Top Gun Training Academy" in Pierre, led by the state officers. The district officers learned the differences of guest vs. host mentality and that, as leaders, we are called upon to be the initiator. Session 2 dove into leading for others and identifying individuals they will be serving as well as finding power in their weaknesses, embracing periods of growth, and facing hard tasks. In the fourth session, district officers practiced communicating effectively by finding purpose and shaping their message. Upon learning about the ripple effect, they were invited to cast their stone into the "FFA Pond" and affect those around them with positive interactions. They wrapped up by building a plan for the future, graduating and achieving Top Gun!

The training included an educational visit to the state capitol building and evening reflection in the capitol rotunda, looking up at the paintings of the four pillars of South Dakota: livestock, industry and mining, agriculture, and family.

While in Pierre, the state and district FFA officers also hosted a Legislative Breakfast, sharing the importance of agriculture education and FFA with our state leaders and learning about current issues facing this legislative session.

On The Road Again!



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FFA Returns to Rodeo Rapid City



South Dakota FFA has found its place as part of Rodeo Rapid City. SD FFA showcased agriculture at the Ag Adventure Zone, January 27th-February 4th for the 3rd FARM BUREAU, year, and also brought in hundreds of FFA members from three

states for FFA Day. District V Officers, FFA members, and special guests all appeared in FFA shirts, promoting agriculture and broadening horizons thanks to industry leaders sharing hands-on presentations.

The FFA Ag Adventure Zone, first showcased in 2020, is sponsored by South Dakota Farm Bureau as a special project of the SD FFA Foundation, and has become a popular attraction at Rodeo Rapid City. Patterned after the FFA Ag Adventure Center at the South Dakota State Fair, both activities share the same mission: "To showcase modern agricultural practices, communication, commitment to natural resources and demonstrate wholesome, safe food production."

"We are thrilled to have the South Dakota FFA Ag Adventure Zone back at Rodeo Rapid City! The activities provide a great way for FFA members to expose and educate the public on how agriculture is immersed throughout our everyday lives," says Amy Muller, Rodeo Rapid City production manager.

District V chapter members presented agricultural games and activities for visitors to partake in as well as speaking to guests about South Dakota agriculture. Ethan Hendrix, District 5 FFA Vice President shares, "The ag adventure zone is a great way to educate the public about agriculture, especially those not exposed to it on a daily basis."

In addition, "FFA Days", January 29-31, expanded to two days and was a key part of RRC. Chapter members heard from and interacted with industry leaders in agricultural educational pathways including animal systems, plant systems, power/structural systems and advocacy/communications. Presenters included: Tyson Foods, SD Beef Industry Council/Wall Meats, SD Pork Producers Council, SD Soil Health Coalition, Bayer, Brinks Constructors, Dakota Mill & Grain, Butler Machinery, SD Farm Bureau, Agtegra Cooperative Innovation Center, NewsCenter1/Homegrown, SD Stockgrowers, and the SD Sheep Growers Association. FFA members asked questions, mimicked different jobs, and gained insight on current agricultural practices. FFA members also had the opportunity to attend livestocks shows, a livestock judging school, cattle and horse sales, and visit with different vendors and cheer on their classmates at the 20X High School Rodeo Showcase. Mercedes Jones, Wessington Springs freshman shared, "I really enjoyed FFA Days. The South Dakota Beef Board and Wall Meats taught how meat gets cut to our

preferred form. I enjoyed the financial planning, learning the 4 pillars of successful farming, and learning about the pork industry from the Pork Council. I think every FFA member deserves to get this incredible opportunity."



FFA Members Strive for SAE **Excellence**

Joseph Grady, McCook Central; Lauren Roling, McCook Central; Benjamin Vandenbark, Colome; and Lacie Weber, Rutland each received \$1000 grants from the National FFA Organization to help create or expand their Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) projects., Farm Credit, the CHS Foundation (two) and General Mills respectively, sponsored their grants. The four SD recipients were selected from 1,296 applications nationwide.



Lacie Weber will use her grant to construct new pens for her pig project, allowing for biosecurity protocols and feed management practices.

Joseph Grady's grant will grow his capacity to raise and sell show sheep, and mentor vouth in the show ring.

Lauren Roling's grant will assist in growing her Ag Education SAE by implementing grain bin safety education for farmers and community members with all kinds of media and events.

Benjamin Vandenbark will use his grant for upkeep of his poultry SAE facilities, feeders, and adding chickens, and test food options for his flock based on weekly weight gain and egg production.





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


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What Will Your FFA Week Include?
